Legislative Report No. 11 2024 Kentucky General Assembly

Today marked the forty-seventh legislative day of the 2024 Session of the Kentucky General Assembly. There has been 587 senate and 971 house bills and resolutions introduced in the first forty-seven legislative days.

Some Bills of Interest:

[HB 1](#) and [HB 6](#), the House budget bills, have not had action by the Senate, so they remain the same as in previous reports. Action by the Senate is expected soon.

[HB 418: M. Pollock – AN ACT relating to agricultural districts.](#)

This bill will decrease the minimum number of acres to qualify as an agricultural district from 250 acres to 50 acres and add cities that are within one mile of the agricultural district to the list of entities to be notified of the proposal, approval, and withdrawal of property from, an agricultural district. The bill will also allow a district board of supervisors to consider possible dissolution of an agricultural district if an owner's withdrawal of property results in the remaining land no longer qualifying as agricultural land. This bill passed the Senate Agriculture Committee and now heads to the full Senate for their consideration.

2024 KFB Priority Issue:

"Support lowering the acreage requirement for establishing an agricultural district."

[SB 356: J. Howell – AN ACT relating to riverports and making an appropriation therefor.](#)

This bill will direct the state portion of property taxes on commercial watercraft to the riverport financial assistance trust fund, which provides matching funds to public riverports. This bill has been assigned to the Senate Appropriations and Revenue Committee.

2024 KFB Priority Issue:

"Support increased funding for Kentucky riverports to upgrade their agricultural infrastructure."

[HB 267: J. Petrie – AN ACT relating to providing for the authorization of the Office of Broadband Development to implement the federal Broadband Equity Access and Deployment \(BEAD\) Program and declaring an emergency.](#)

This bill will establish the Broadband Equity Access and Development Program (BEAD) within the Office of Broadband Development, define terms, and require the Office of Broadband Development to create and administer the BEAD Program. This bill will also establish program application requirements and create the BEAD fund. The bill was amended in committee to prioritize BEAD Program funds for delivery to the last mile of unserved areas consistent with the federal requirements. This bill passed the House [95-0](#) and now heads to the Senate for their consideration.

2024 KFB Priority Issues:

"Support funding for the broadband deployment fund."

"Support efforts and incentives to improve and provide all telecommunications in rural Kentucky."

[HB 553: M. Koch – AN ACT relating to the Kentucky rural veterinary student loan repayment program and making an appropriation therefor.](#)

This bill will establish the Kentucky Rural Veterinary Medicine Student Loan Repayment Program for an eligible livestock practitioner who engages in veterinary medicine in an underserved rural area or veterinary shortage area for five consecutive years. This bill will authorize the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority to promulgate administrative regulations and set forth program eligibility requirements. This bill will also authorize the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority to award loan repayment benefits to applicants selected by the Veterinary Student Loan Repayment Selection Committee, establish compliance requirements, and create the rural veterinary care trust fund. This bill has been assigned to the House Appropriations and Revenue Committee.

KFB Policy:

"In an effort to address the shortage of large and food animal veterinary services in Kentucky, we support: incentive programs for veterinarians and licensed veterinary technicians and technologists to practice large and food animal veterinary medicine in rural Kentucky."

SB 16: J. Schickel – AN ACT relating to agricultural key infrastructure assets.

This bill will amend KRS 511.100, relating to trespass upon key infrastructure assets, to add commercial food manufacturing or processing facility, animal feeding operation, and concentrated animal feeding operation to the definition of "key infrastructure assets". This bill will penalize those who operate an unmanned aircraft system, video recording device, audio recording device, or photography equipment on or above the assets without consent and penalize those who record or distribute unauthorized images or material of a concentrated animal feeding operation, animal feeding operation, or commercial food manufacturing or processing facility. This bill was amended in the House Agriculture Committee to allow a federal, state, or local government law enforcement or regulatory officer or employee to operate any unmanned aircraft system, video or audio recording device, or photography equipment on or above a concentrated animal feeding operation, animal feeding operation, or commercial food manufacturing or processing facility without the consent of the owner or authorized representative of the facility while engaged in his or her official duties. This bill passed the House Agriculture Committee and now heads to the full House for their consideration.

KFB Policy:

"We support requiring the operator of the UAS to gain the written consent of the landowner and/or farm operator if the UAS will be surveying or gathering data above private property."

"We recommend anyone, group or organization that video tapes or records images on a farm with the intent of using them in an anti-farming or animal welfare campaign, without the permission of the land/farm owner, be charged with a criminal offense and subject to a reasonable fine and/or other punishment."

HB 400: R. Heath AND SB 189: J. Howell – AN ACT relating to veterinary medicine programs at comprehensive universities.

These identical bills will amend KRS 164.295 to permit Murray State University to offer doctor's degrees required for professional practice and licensure in veterinary medicine.

HB 575: R. Heath – AN ACT relating to the acquisition of agricultural land.

This bill will prohibit a nonresident alien, foreign business, foreign agent, trustee, or fiduciary associated with the government of any proscribed country referenced in 22 C.F.R. sec. 126.1 from the purchase, lease, or acquisition of agricultural land in Kentucky or participation in programs administered by the Department of Agriculture, Agricultural Development Board, and Kentucky Agricultural Finance Corporation. This bill will allow an existing foreign-owned business to purchase adjacent agricultural land to expand the operations of the business and will exempt foreign ownership or leasing of up to 350 acres for research purposes. This bill will establish the Kentucky Foreign Investment Review Board to review applications for appeal for those on the prohibited countries list wishing to purchase, lease, or acquire agricultural land, set forth requirements of the board to approve or deny an application for appeal, establish a process for an application for appeal, and authorize the board to promulgate administrative regulations. This bill will also allow an applicant who is denied an appeal to purchase agricultural land to appeal the final decision in Circuit Court. This bill will require a county clerk to record an affidavit on any deed that conveys agricultural land and report the affidavit recordings monthly to the Kentucky Foreign Investment Review Board, require the Kentucky Foreign Investment Review Board to report to the Committee on Foreign Investment in the United States each month. This bill will also set forth requirements to divest land that has been purchased, leased, or denied without approval of the Kentucky Foreign Investment Review Board, and direct the distribution of sale proceeds. This bill has been reassigned to the House Appropriations and Revenue Committee.
